Repatriation and rematriation are crucial for sound and audiovisual archives. Evoking the return of sounds to their source communities brought about key topics in contemporary ethnomusicological debate: the decolonization of the discipline; the development of dialogic methodologies; the accessibility of sources; the historical study of music of oral tradition; and the public use of ethnomusicological knowledge.

Although ethnomusicologists have addressed repatriation for decades, technological and sociocultural changes have raised new questions that call for renewed reflection. Who are the subjects entitled to repatriation projects in an increasingly deterritorialised world? Who holds the rights over the documentation of the past? How do local and global access to archival collections relate in the digital era? How to balance the interests of entitled repatriation subjects and institutions' public service mission? How to make restitution sustainable? The seminar aims to provide an overview of the latest theories and research methodologies on the topic, as well as present internationally implemented good practices, fostering a fruitful debate in the perspective of public ethnomusicology.
